## St Mary's Primary School in Mullaghobawn develops world aspirations.

St Mary's Primary School in Mullaghobawn recently scooped €79,725 under the Erasmus+ scheme, the EU's flagship programme for education, training, youth and sport, and through it, are hoping to help pupils develop as global citizens.

Erasmus+, which is managed by British Council – and Eco-Schools Delivery Partner - and Ecorys UK, is helping the County Armagh school work with five countries across Europe – Finland, Greece, Spain, Ireland and Italy, on two complementing projects. They aim to promote IT skills, environmental awareness, a second language and even a happier work environment, ultimately working towards achieving the Eco-Schools 'Green Flag' award.

Ciara Crawley, the Erasmus+ Coordinator at the school, said: "We firmly believe that a good project impacts on not only the school involved, but also the wider community, to which each school belongs. Here at St Mary's we've developed a real community spirit – working with parents and grandparents and others within the local area. It's really important for us to have their support."

St Mary's Primary School have worked with the British Council for the past 12 years, initially developing European contacts through Comenius and working with a partner school in Finland and subsequently working with schools through the eTwinning programme.

The school is now looking further east for the year ahead – with plans afoot to partner with a school in China. The project will see St Mary's lead a cluster of ten schools in Northern Ireland who are forming links in China through the British Council's Connecting Classroom's programme.

Ciara said, "This is great for us as a school as we're used to working with schools outside of Northern Ireland but not with ones in our own backyard – it's wonderful to have a chance to collaborate like this. Working with schools in China will also be amazing and it will complement the Mandarin classes that we already have in place here."

## Global learning initiative off to a great start

Over 70 schools have already registered for the new Global Learning Programme (GLP) who were sponsors of the Eco-Schools 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Event. The formal education project is funded by the UK government to enhance global learning at Key Stage 2 & 3. The Programme is managed by the Centre for Global Education and provides support spanning twelve months to all participating schools to help them embed global learning across the curriculum using a whole school approach.



Schools begin the process by nominating a teacher to lead on global learning, who then attends two days of CPD training and cascades their increased knowledge throughout the school. Training days were held in Belfast, Cookstown and Derry. Further training dates will subsequently be held in the autumn.

## Quality award for Lough Neagh Discovery Centre Interpretive team

Congratulations to the Interpretive team at Lough Neagh Discovery Centre. After months of hard work they have been awarded the Learning Outside the Classroom Quality Badge award.

The team are now officially recognised with a stamp of quality for its Environmental Education and Learning outside the Classroom Programmes. They are only the third organisation in Northern Ireland to achieve this award.



The LOTC Quality Badge means that the team has passed a robust assessment designed to ensure that they are meeting schools' learning and risk management needs, no matter what activities they offer.

The purpose of the badge is to help schools identify good quality and safe provision, and to reduce red tape when planning educational visits. It incorporates existing safety standards for all types of activity and combines learning and safety into one easily recognisable accreditation for all organisations providing learning outside the classroom.

“We have been working towards the award for a while and we were delighted when we received the email to say that we were successful. It is excellent recognition for the hard work everyone has put it over the past 5 years and we are all delighted” said Andy Griggs, Conservation Education and Activities Officer.

## Eco-Schools International Updates

Now this is what we call taking Eco-Schools actions to the next level. Giles Clarke (nine years old) is a student at Fish Hoek Primary School in Cape Town, which is an Eco-School. Giles Clarke, Jon O'Hanlon and Darren Clarke, (Giles's Dad) are running across the African continent, starting in the Skeleton Coast region on the west coast of Namibia adjacent to the Namib Desert.

They are running to raise awareness around Water, Elephants and Education and the youngest participant, Giles, will be acting as an "Eco-Schools Ambassador" for Eco-Schools and WESSA along the route. Things are starting to gain momentum now as the team leaves on 1 June.

Their run will take them across 3,000 km of often-uncharted terrain, following rivers, elephant migration routes, and cultural and natural heritage sites, to the east coast of Mozambique near the mouth of the Limpopo river. They will run approximately 45 km every day, with a rest day every seventh day, taking nearly four months to finish.

The purpose for their run is to attract people's attention and their awareness to two major issues facing the Earth, and southern Africa in particular. Firstly, the sustainability of the planet, and in particular water sustainability. South Africa is one of the world's top water scarce regions. Secondly, the nearing extinction of the sub-Saharan African elephant. This is due primarily to poaching for the ivory trade, with water scarcity as a result of climate change also affecting their survival.

In South Africa the FEE Eco-Schools programme is implemented by WESSA (the Wildlife and Environmental Society of South Africa), who have appointed young Giles as an **Eco-Schools ambassador**. Giles will be recording his observations of the elephant conservation and water sustainability issues in pictures and on video. He will also be doing a mini SASS (stream assessment scoring system) analysis of every stream, river and body of water that the expedition team crosses on their route across Africa, and uploading the results onto the international mini SASS bio-monitoring site.

Giles will be running 5km every day with the athletes. And in case you thought he wasn't busy enough already, what with all of these activities as well as the home schooling he will be doing every day – he will also be distributing information. Since the route that the runners will be following will take them through many villages of the local and indigenous peoples of Southern Africa, Giles will be providing hand-outs and educational material on environmentalism, correct water usage and sustainability, elephant conservation, and human-elephant conflict issues.

**Giles is launching a "Connect The Children" campaign. This involves sharing all of the observations and experiences that he encounters in his trip across Africa with all the children at the Eco-Schools in the 59 countries in which the Eco-Schools programme is running. He also hopes to try and extend this to other countries as well to broaden the reach of the programme.**
